Monday, December 11, 2017

The Bluest Eye by Toni Morrison

The Bluest Eye is Toni Morrison's first novel, a book heralded for its richness of language and boldness of vision. Set in the author's girlhood hometown of Lorain Ohio, it tells the story of black, eleven-year-old Pecola Breedlove. Pecola prays for her eyes to turn blue so that she will be as beautiful as beloved as all the blond, blue-eyed children in America. In the autumn of 1941, the year the marigold in the Breedloves' garden do not bloom, Pecola's life does change—in painful, devastating ways. With its vivid evocation of the feat and loneliness at the heart of a child's yearning, and the tragedy of its fulfillment, *The Bluest Eye* remains one of Toni Morrison's most powerful, unforgettable novels—and a significant work of American fiction. Monday, January 15, 2018 The Underground Railroad by Colson Whitehead

Cora is a slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia. Life is hellish for all the slaves but especially bad for Cora; an outcast even among her fellow Africans, she is coming into womanhood - where even greater pain awaits. When Caesar, a recent arrival from Virginia, tells her about the Underground Railroad, they decide to take a terrifying risk and escape. Matters do not go as planned and, though they manage to find a station and head north, they are being hunted. As Whitehead brilliantly re-creates the unique terrors for black people in the pre-Civil War era, his narrative seamlessly weaves the saga of America from the brutal importation of Africans to the unfulfilled promises of the present day. *The Underground Railroad* is at once a kinetic adventure tale of one woman's ferocious will to escape the horrors of bondage and a shattering, powerful meditation on the history we all share. Monday, February 12, 2018 *The Bridal Chair* by Gloria Goldreich

Thirty years ago, the world lost a great artist, Moishe Shagal, better known as Marc Chagall. For the exhibition of his work at MoMA in 1946, he was hailed by a critic as "a hero who had not only eluded the Nazis but had triumphed over them by painting the Jewish world they had thought to destroy." The real story of his life and work is more nuanced and fascinating. A man of immense contradictions, hailed as the quintessential Jewish artist of the 20th century. He was a brilliant, innovative printmaker, ceramicist and theatrical designer as well as a prescient modernist, whose signature style glowed with bold colors. But it is his cool, almost desolate white-suffused painting, *The Bridal Chair*, created for his only daughter's wedding in 1934. This biofiction of Chagall's daughter, Ida Chagall Meyer proceeds chronologically in an old-fashioned, story-telling prose that is rich in descriptions that evoke time and place. It's a fact-based but imaginative re-creation of an important man and a critical time. (Hadassah Magazine)

Monday, March 12, 2018 The Rent Collector by Cameron Wright

Survival for Ki Lim and Sang Ly is a daily battle at Stung Meanchey, the largest municipal waste dump in all of Cambodia. They make their living scavenging recyclables from the trash. Life would be hard enough without the worry for their chronically ill child, Nisay, and the added expense of medicines that are not working. Just when things seem worst, Sang Ly learns a secret about the bad-tempered rent collector who comes demanding money—a secret that sets in motion a tide that will change the life of everyone it sweeps past. The Rent Collector is a story of hope, of one woman's journey to save her son and another woman's chance at redemption.
