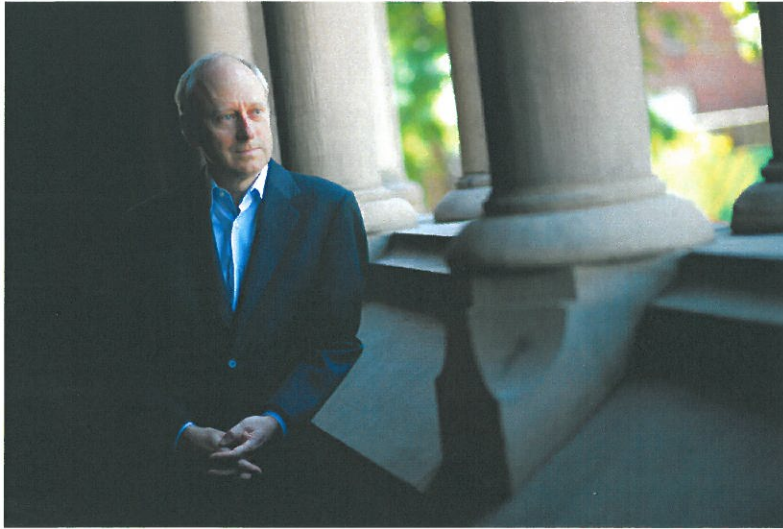

Justice, Money, and Markets

Political philosopher Michael Sandel has been described as “perhaps the most prominent college professor in America.”¹ His legendary course “Justice,” the first Harvard course to be made freely available online and on television, has been viewed by millions of people around the world.

Sandel’s new book, *What Money Can’t Buy: The Moral Limits of Markets*, takes on one of the biggest ethical questions of our time: what should be the role of money and markets in our society? Critics have called it “a brilliant, indispensable book on the relationship between morality and economics”² and “one of the most important exercises in public philosophy in many years.”³

Sandel did his graduate work at Oxford University, where he was Brandeis’ first American Rhodes Scholar. He has served for many years on the Brandeis Board of Trustees.
